


2 years. I also had a concussion too. All that was my freshman year." Kincaid fractured his finger his freshman year. Moreno had a dead leg and arm injury as well.

"Freshmen was new but good. It was fun to do the scavenger hunt and meet everyone, the upperclassmen being there was more crowded but felt more like it would everyday."


